(a) **Standard.**

When a youth is admitted to the security unit, a qualified health care professional or health-trained personnel must be informed immediately and must complete an assessment as determined by the health authority. Unless medical attention is needed more frequently, each youth in security receives a daily visit from a nurse.

(b) **Procedures.**

- (1) As required by [INS.45.31](#), each time a youth is admitted to the security unit a **health-trained security unit staff member** completes a Security Health Screening form, [INS-218](#), and immediately notifies the infirmary.
 - (2) If there has been no use of force associated with the security unit admission, a **nurse** checks the youth's medical record and informs security staff of any special medical needs. Nursing staff review the completed INS-218 and take any appropriate action.
 - (3) **A nurse:**
 - (A) completes a face-to-face assessment as soon as feasible if the youth was involved in a use of force, as required by [GAP.380.9723](#);
 - (B) documents the encounter on the Security Unit: Nurses' Log form, [INS-217](#); and
 - (C) documents the assessment in the EMR.
 - (4) As required by [HSP.04.04](#), a nurse conducts daily sick call on the security unit and documents the sick call encounter on the INS-217.
 - (5) If a youth reports or staff observes any non-emergency health concerns that require further nursing assessment, the staff notifies infirmary staff and, if instructed by the nurse, brings the youth to the infirmary for a nursing assessment. The nurse documents the assessment in the EMR and ensures referrals are made to the appropriate medical or mental health service providers if indicated.
 - (6) Emergency health concerns are handled in accordance with [INS.45.05](#).
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
