

Ashley Kintzer, Manager of Regionalization, began her career working for the Texas Attorney General in the Prosecutor Assistance, Cyber Crimes Unit where she assisted prosecutors with trial preparation and case review. In 2008, Ashley began working for TJJD's legacy agency TYC in the Office of General Counsel in the Appeals Unit. In 2012, Ashley began working in the Policy Administration Unit where she coordinated the development of TJJD rules, policies, procedures, and administrative directives. Ashley joined the regionalization team in February 2016. As the regionalization program coordinator, Ashley was the liaison between the regional county program administrators and central office and analyzes regionalization data. Ashley is now the manager over two units: Regionalization Fiscal and Program Teams. Ashley graduated from St. Edward's University in 2004 with a BA in criminal justice and a minor in communications. Ashley graduated from Texas State University in 2008 with a Master's in Criminal Justice.

Tonya Gonzalez, Manager of County Grants, began her career at TJJD's legacy agency TJPC, in April 2006 in the Title IV-E Foster Care Reimbursement Program. She joined the Regionalization Team in February 2020 where she reviews and processes the county grant budgets, contracts, adjustments, amendments, and expenditures. Tonya holds a BS in International Business and Marketing from Alliant International University in San Diego, California. She is also a proud mother of three children.

Jim Wilson, Regional County Program Administrator, entered the corrections field in 2001 as a case manager at a Bureau of Prisons halfway house in San Diego. At that time, he joined the Travis County Juvenile Probation Department as a supervisor in their Detention Center. Mark served on the HB 431 Texas Juvenile Justice Department Records Advisory Committee proposing changes to Texas Family Code chapter 58, which eventually led to the passing of SB 1304 in the 85th legislative session. The 83rd Legislative Session required a Statewide Juvenile Fingerprint study committee to determine if the current fingerprint laws needed to be changed due to some children being hurt by the current law. He was the chairman of the Texas Senate Bill 1769 Fingerprint Study Committee. The work led to the passage of SB 409 in the 84th legislature that limited distribution of non-adjudicated juvenile records to only law enforcement agencies and DFPS. Mark

has been a Texas Juvenile Justice Department Advisory Council Member since 2011 and served as Vice Chair from 2016-2017. He was also a Texas Juvenile Probation Commission Advisory Council Member from 2010-2011. Mark joined the regionalization team in November 2017 and is currently assigned to the Central, Panhandle, and West Regions. Mark graduated from Texas Tech University in 1979 with a BS in finance. Mark graduated from Abilene Christian University in 1982 with a MA in biblical and related studies with an emphasis in counseling.
